Syderstone's Book Exchange – now open

As many of you know, our former telephone box in The Street has been completely refurbished, repainted inside and out, by Gerry Taylor, a former BT payphone engineer and helpers Roddie MacLeod, Julie and Michael Parker (see front page photo). Gerry also fitted it out with shelving, made to measure in his garage. Wood was donated by Paul Page, of Economy Timber, Syderstone Business Park and the flooring was donated by Lee Reynolds, of North Norfolk Carpets & Tiles, Four Winds, while Paul Ebden, local artist and craftsman re-gilded the crowns on four sides of the box and created the outside signage. Many other village folk lent a hand. Local Parish Councillor Martin Bateman acted as liaison between the Parish Council and the workers.

It was only last year that the current phone box became redundant and the Parish Council applied for permission to take it over as a village resource. Enormous thanks are due to all the helpers, and donors, but especially Gerry, who was responsible for making sure that the telephone box had a preservation order on it some years ago, which prevented it from being demolished or sold off elsewhere, and who spent many hours getting it ready and in superb condition to house the book collection, which has been moved from the cramped former egg sale box. Books are available for local people to borrow or swap, all free of charge.

The Book Exchange was formally opened on 16th August by Dawn Niemann, Chair of the Syderstone Parish Council.

Syderstone's Jubilee celebrations

Lots of you joined in with the Syderstone celebrations marking HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee over the bank holiday weekend in June. It provided plenty of opportunities to meet up with friends and neighbours and make new connections too. The Amy Robsart Village Hall (ARVH) and St Mary's Church were the focus for most of the activities which included a bar for three nights, a BBQ, pool competition, the official coronation film, the Syderstone archive, live stream of the 'Platinum Party at the Palace' on the Saturday and a superb community tea party on the Sunday afternoon.

St Mary's was packed for the celebration church service and we were honoured to welcome Lady Romney, Deputy Lieutenant for Norfolk, representing Her Majesty. Diana Humphries, Syderstone's most senior resident, lit the Jubilee beacon on the playing field after the service. This was part of the national chain of beacons across the UK. Syderstone's beacon burned bright in the night sky as a superb sunset provided a fitting end to the first day.



The organising group were fairly worried on the Sunday morning when they saw the weather forecast. Rain! ('What's that? What about our carefully laid plans for a full scale street party in The Street?') The organisers went ahead and closed The Street and put up the final bunting decorations but with heavy hearts took the decision that for everyone's comfort and safety the street party would be relocated. 200 people had said they were coming and housing them all indoors created a logistical challenge! St Mary's saved the day, welcoming folks in for their tea and picnics, with ARVH providing space for the rest. Some of the tables, crockery and tea urns, to say nothing of scones, jam (made by Pam) and cream, were swiftly relocated across the road. With both buildings practically full to capacity, the tea party went with a swing in both locations. With the Jubilee raffle drawn, sandwiches and cakes consumed and take-away packages made up, the stalwart folk of Syderstone proved that they weren't going to let a bit of the wet stuff get in their way!

A huge community effort, so many people played a part in making Syderstone's Jubilee celebrations special. The organising committee, the Parish Council, the ARVH, the bunting makers, the 'up the ladderers', beacon builders, our beacon lighter, St Mary's Church (especially for saving the street party), the mug donors, the tea brewers, washer uppers, beer organisers, bar staff, bakers, furniture removers, knitters, street sweepers, 'cleaner uppers', flower arrangers, table decorators, the jam maker, the 'cream whisk team', scone deliverers, raffle ticket sellers and buyers, raffle prize donors, the 'road closurers', everyone who made the effort to decorate their own property and the Jubilee 'Facebook Queen'.

To include a list of names would mean that almost certainly somebody would get forgotten. We thank you all everyone who played a part – you know who you are and we are very grateful for everything you did.

Local community car service for Syderstone residents

Did you know that there is a local, friendly and reliable door to door car service, available in Syderstone, seven days a week for anyone without personal transport? The Great Massingham Area Community Car Scheme is a not-for-profit organisation, funded by donations from individuals and a range of organisations including Syderstone Parish Council.

The trips are chargeable and the costs are reasonable and based on a 'Standard Fares' card. People using the service simply pay the driver. However, the scheme has recently introduced a scheme that gives free travel for medical appointments to Syderstone parishioners who claim either pension or universal credit. This is an experiment to see what might be possible to ease the cost-of-living crisis for those on lower incomes, the aim is to ensure that no parishioner misses medical appointments due to lack of funds.

NATURALLY SYDERSTONE

If the prospect of a creature with eight legs doesn't spook you, then pause your reading for just five minutes and take a walk around your house. Look up to the ceiling and in the corners, especially the dark ones. There's a very good chance that in at least one room you will see an animal that you don't ever recall seeing in your childhood. And that's because you didn't. The name hints at this creature's dual nature – the daddy long-legs spider. Those exceedingly long, spindly legs, five times the size of its body – which itself looks like a fusion of a peanut and a miniature human skull – have something of the daddy long-legs (aka the crane fly) about them, though the two are unrelated. They also remind us of a harvestman, the grassstalking cousin of this beast. But these are most certainly spiders, their favourite meals are insects and other spiders, and, if food is short, they'll eat each other.

Nobody is quite sure when *Pholcus phalangioides* first made its appearance in Britain, but it probably arrived this century as a passenger in cargoes from south-east Asia. It's not a fan of the colder north, but a warm Norfolk house in autumn suits it very well. It sits motionless in its web of fine threads for hours at a time. If you flick a duster and touch the web, watch the spider vibrate furiously in an instinctive act of self-defence. Once they are in your home, you'll see a decline in other spiders, including big, hairy *Tegenaria* species, the ones on the pull in autumn that pop up in the bath, or run across the floor. And just like them, it is perfectly harmless to humans. Though they might just give you a touch of the shivers if you are an arachnophobe.



Recipe time variations on the humble crumble

With so much fruit around at the moment, there's never been a better pudding than the humble crumble. For variety why not swap not only the fruit filling but also the crumble topping too? Here's some suggestions:

Crumble topping	Fruit filling ideas
225g (8oz) plain or wholewheat flour	Apples and raspberries
100g (3.5 oz) butter	Apples and blackberries
80-100g (3 – 3.5oz) soft brown sugar	Apples, sultanas and cinnamon
Variations	Plums (stoned first)
Use half the amount of flour plus	Damsons and cinnamon
110g (4oz) porridge oats OR	Rhubarb and ginger
Use half the amount of flour plus	Mincemeat and apple (lovely for the
110g (4oz) muesli	winter months)
For extra crunch try adding chopped	
almonds or hazelnuts	

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan/350°F/Gas Mark 4
- 2. Cut the butter into cubes and place in a mixing bowl with the flour.
- 3. Rub the butter into the flour until it resembles breadcrumbs, then stir in the sugar.
- 4. Sprinkle this crumble topping over 500g of prepared fruit (see above) sweetened with a little sugar if liked.
- 5. Bake in a preheated oven at for about 30-40 mins until golden.

Short on time? You can make the crumble topping ahead and it stores well in the fridge for a day or you can freeze it for up to three months.

And lastly, Gardening Corner

As I sit compiling these words, I look out over a very parched brown lawn. As we all know it's been a challenging summer to keep our gardens in bloom and our plots productive.

It's been interesting to see which plants and crops have managed to cope with the lack of water and the many which haven't. Climate change is here to stay and that means we all may have to think differently about how we plant our soil. For me it's going to be more drought-tolerant grasses and maybe sowing veg for spring and autumn leaving the summer drought to do less harm.

There are lots of beautiful flowers that like it dry, one of my favourites being the salvia family. So many different colours mixed in amongst evergreens, giving height and structure to the border.

One of my favourite grasses is Stipa Gigantea (golden wild oat). They grow to around 4 or 5 feet and have fabulous seed heads that wave and rustle gently in the breeze. Then with the late afternoon sunlight shining through them they come alive with colour, a real picture to behold.

Well friends, let's continue to enjoy our outside spaces, however large or small and wait for the rains to come and all to be green again once more.
